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The Sixth Term Examination Paper (STEP) Mathematics

If you're applying for certain courses at the University of Cambridge or the University of Warwick, you may need to take STEP. Other universities recommend you take it too.

- The University of Cambridge asks Mathematics applicants to achieve certain STEP grades, as part of conditional offers made to candidates.
- For the University of Cambridge, other courses/course combinations may also require STEP. For details, see: cam.ac.uk/step.
- The University of Warwick may ask applicants to achieve certain STEP grades in its undergraduate Mathematics and Data Science offers.
- Other courses and universities encourage applicants to take STEP. Please visit the university websites for more information.

What's in the test from 2019?

As before, there are three STEP papers. If you are taking STEP as part of a conditional offer from a university, the paper(s) you need to take will be explained in the university's offer letter.

Each paper is 3 hours long and all questions carry equal marks. You choose 6 questions to answer, and there's no restriction on which questions you choose.

STEP assesses your ability to apply mathematical knowledge in novel and unfamiliar ways. Questions are longer than at A Level, and demand persistence and insight. Marks are awarded for candidates who make good progress towards the solution, as well as for correct answers.

For the 2019 examination onwards, the specification and the number of questions for each paper will change. The style of the individual questions will not change.

Provisionally, in summary:

STEP I is based on A Level Mathematics. The paper has 11 questions across two sections: the first contains 8 pure questions, and the second contains 2 mechanics questions and 1 probability question.

STEP II is based on A Level Mathematics and AS Level Further Mathematics. The paper has 12 questions across three sections: the first contains 8 pure questions, the second contains 2 mechanics questions, and the third contains 2 probability/statistics questions.

STEP III is based on A Level Mathematics and A Level Further Mathematics. The paper has 12 questions across three sections: the first contains 8 pure questions, the second contains 2 mechanics questions, and the third contains 2 probability/statistics questions.

A detailed specification for 2019 will be available on the website in the summer of 2018.

Where do I take STEP?

You must take the test at a registered test centre.

Your school or college may already be a test centre – check with your Exams Officer. Please note, your school or college may charge an administration fee in addition to the test fee.

If you are not able to take the test at school or college, you need to find an authorised open test centre where you can take the test. These centres usually charge an administration fee in addition to the test fee.

If your school or college is not already registered as a centre, they can apply to become a test centre – even if you are the only person taking a test.

What if I need Access Arrangements?
